

## CAPE ANN PIANO STUDIO: OTHER INFORMATION

### CREDENTIALS

### STUDIO

Equipment: Yamaha G1 acoustic baby grand piano

Hardware/Software: iPad Pro, apps used for audio/video recordings (student/parent reference, teaching example clips) and note/rhythm etc. drills; extensive music library: sheet music, music teaching aids, and audio materials

### YOUR PIANO

Your piano should not only be kept in tune it should also be well maintained (e.g., all the keys and pedals working, etc.). It should be tuned twice a year. I recommend my piano technician/tuner Yun Swanson, or Ben Webster.

The practice area should be well lit; it is imperative for music-reading skills that students have direct light on their music as well as ambient light in the room. Piano lamps are necessary in most homes (if you need info on what type to purchase, just ask).

Bench should be at the right height for the student (we will talk about this frequently in lessons). If your child's feet do not yet touch the floor, please place a footstool (or similar) under their feet.

Pencils, erasers, and a playing device, e.g., iPhone, iPad, laptop with speakers, should be within reach of the piano.

Please make sure your piano is away from distractions—TV, siblings/friends, pets, video games—but (ideally) situated where you can hear your child playing!

### AT THE LESSON

Please have your child ready (hands washed, bathroom trips done, if possible) before the lesson.

Please don't come early to the lesson; kids: please walk in when it's your lesson time, no need to knock or wait for the previous student to come out.

*Please have books open and ready to go at the time of your lesson. Every minute counts!*

*Fingernails need to be trimmed short, even with the end of the fingertips.* If they are not, lesson time may be spent trimming them.

Absolutely no food, drinks, or gum during lessons!

Mine is an open-door policy; although I teach children alone, you may sit in on a lesson at any time.

Very young students (5–6) need parent attendance for each lesson at the very beginning of study.

Please observe silently without interruption and take note of my suggestions regarding practice, technique, etc. I encourage all parents to come in for at least the last 5 minutes as much as they can to review the assignment for the week, especially elementary-age students. I'm happy to briefly answer a quick question or two at the *beginning* of the lesson, so that it's on the student's time and doesn't take up the time of the next student; if you need more than a few minutes, call me during my office hours (see below) or email me about anything at all regarding lessons.

## BOOKS AND MATERIALS

All students need to have the required books and materials for lessons, to be determined on a case-by-case basis. I have a Book Deposit system to purchase books. Please see below.

Book Deposit: I purchase method and other piano books for younger students. A book deposit in the amount of \$50 is made; you will receive a book deposit account sheet, which is placed in the back of the student's assignment binder. When the deposit is depleted, another book deposit in the amount of \$50 will be added via check or cash in the studio.

In addition to their piano lesson books, all school-age students will need:

- **Hard-cover, 1/2-inch**, 3-ring binder with pockets
- iPad/iPod/Computer connected to speakers for better volume if needed and within easy reach of student, preferably with a remote
- Metronome: Being old-fashioned I prefer the nice loud battery-operated ones, but apps work too. Best one in my opinion, that was brought to my attention by a young student! is Pro Metronome
- Composition Notebook (black and white ones are great)

## PRACTICE

I have many sources of information on practice requirements/guidelines.

## PERFORMANCE OPPORTUNITIES

Performance opportunities are scheduled throughout the year. The North Shore Piano Teachers Guild holds three "formal" recitals a year—all of my students may participate in any of these recitals. These include students from all over the North Shore. We hold a Holiday Piano Party (December) and an Annual Spring Recital (June), and other casual, when possible to schedule, piano parties and group lessons throughout the year. There is also a fun event in which students can play whatever they like! at the Topsfield Fair in October. The Holiday Piano Party is casual and a wonderful chance for students to play for each other and their parents in a relaxed, festive atmosphere. The Spring Recital (June) is held at the First Universalist Church in Essex on usually the second weekend in June and is just a bit more "formal." All students are encouraged to participate in any of these events. *All students are expected to perform in the Spring Recital, when set, please put this date in your calendars!*
